

Our endeavor is to impart the highest quality of education and grooming the students to fit in the corporate world . Every year we obtain feedback from the students to monitor their satisfactiolevel so that we can give better service to the forthcoming batches.

Aim: To achieve better position amongst all academic institutions.

Objective: To give better facilities to students enabling them to enhance their overall performance.

General Feedback

A questionnaire containing 10 parameters was prepared to obtain feedback from students to find out the image of the college. A random sample of 150 students was considered. Students had shown their satisfaction in almost all aspects covered in the Feedback form which is enclosed for your perusal. However, their major demands are: Regular cleaning of wash rooms of block A, More no. of microscopes in Biology labs, Provision of new apparatus in physics lab, provision of at least 4 books and reference books for home issue, Proper way of giving instructions,. Declaration of exam dates before a suitable time period.

Feed back on Teachers' performance:

A questionnaire containing 7 parameters was considered to take feedback on individual teacher's performance from students. A random sample of 15 students for every teacher was taken. Students are satisfied with their relationship with teachers, teaching methodology, approach of generating interest in the subject and the way of responding their doubts. It shows that the practices used by all the teachers are fairly good. However, they need to concentrate on the aspects, viz. curriculum coverage, towards inspiration and quality of the subject material provided to students.

Parents 'feedback:

Most of the parents visit the college at the time of admission. Very few parents attend parent's meeting and respond to the feedback. However, time to time we interact with parents either on phone or in person when they visit our college and always we found that they are happy with the day to day teaching and the conduct of unit tests. But our concern about the response to the feedback from the parents who are unable to contribute due to inability to express their own views regarding enrichment of syllabus, teaching methods etc.

Feedback from final year students:

We have collected feedback from final year students on 16 parameters. Majority of the students have given positive feedback on almost all parameters.

Feedback from alumni:

Alumni meet is conducted once in a year where they contribute their practical experiences along with their commitment to deliver lectures to enable our students' to face outside competition

Feedback from companies coming from campus placement:

As per the discussion of our Convener, T&P Cell, with HR persons of different companies, they require confident students having basics of domain for their placement.

1. Rendering helping hand

Goal

You will learn more when you teach someone else. The secret to obtaining more knowledge is teaching more people as possible and available. Keeping this in mind we are determined to serve the society in many folds.

The Context

Our country is very rich in the context of literally everything. That to say environmental conditions, favorable conditions for crop productivity, natural resources etc. But we lack in knowledge of its utility on every level of understanding i.e. the research we carry out does not rich to the common man, the facts of the soil conditions, crop conditions, their immunity to various diseases as well—known to locals does not understand to scientist, awareness about development, requirement for the development are totally unknown to the common man. Hence as a small step towards making the underprivileged aware about at least some facts, we organize various events.

The Practice

- To arrange eye check-up camps for the people from villages.
- To promote cultural/educational activities in villages.
- To promote awareness programs on Child / women's Health and Nutrition, equality, development, violence against women's in urban slums and villages.
- To organize blood donation camps.
- To organize various activities for old age people and homeless/helpless children.
- To organize cultural events for the homeless and differently abled children.
- To promote, propagate, develop general interest of people in plantation and environmental awareness.
- Assist on relieve for targeted communities affected by a natural calamity.
- Assist in eliminating pollution & environmental deterioration and building up an ecological balance with clean & green environment.

All the above mentioned programmes are carried out with the coordination from NSS students and Organization for Industrial, Spiritual & Cultural Advancement (OISCA), Western India Chapter, Nagpur.

Evidence of Success

A weeklong camp was organized at the outskirts of the city viz. village Gonhi, Yerla. The villagers responded enthusiastically to various activities carried out in the camp. Wherein educational, cultural, clean and green environment, plastic free environment, eye checkup, spects donation, eye surgery in association with Wasan Eye Care, Blood donation camp was organized on the occasion of Birth anniversary celebrations of our founder president.

A visit to homeless was also organized.

Tree plantation at various organizations, schools and colleges are done.

An artificial water tank was installed for Idol immersion to avoid water pollution of natural reservoirs in city area. Celebrated the Rakhi Programme by tying Rakhi thread to peoples in Central Jail and policeman staff of central Jail on the occasion of 'Raksha Bandhan'.

A rally "Jammu and Kashmir relief Funds" for flood affected peoples in Jammu and Kashmir areas and collected amount about Rs. 35000/- rupees that handed over to District Collector.

Also collected the Blankets, cloths, old cloths, dresses, umbrellas, medicine and other materials for Jammu and Kashmir Flood affected people.

A fund of about Rs.15000/- collected for student of Anjuman Engineering College, Nagpur, who got affected by Head injury and was in Trauma at J.J Hospital, Mumbai.

An awareness programme viz. 'Vyasan Muktti' to aware the people from tobacco and smoking addiction, rainwater harvesting, and on 'Drive Safely on Road'.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The attitude and time constraint are the major problems encountered in the implementation of programme. Further, encouraging students and discussions in the meeting becomes self-obliterate towards its aim, at times. The beneficiaries are required to explain their needs in their understandable language as they are from villages. Questions posed by them may not find a solution instantaneously. The span to carry out the programme is limited and tracking or follow-up may not be possible. Teachers have to play the role of an educator and entertainer combined, rather than just an educator.

Resources in terms of finance are continuously in demand to fulfil aim. This is not available consistently.

An Academic Calendar is prepared before the beginning of the academic year. This aids the programmers to follow the time schedule for implementation of the various programmes. Dedicated teaching and non-teaching staff coordinates with the students to carry out programme. Without a dedicated team, success cannot be achieved. 2. Soil-less Rooftop Organic Farming

Goal: To provide low cost eco-friendly farming, an alternative to retrench agricultural land.

The context: The agriculturists in India are facing a big problem of supplying food to ever increasing population as agricultural land is decreasing due to fast growing urbanization and industrialization. The food we consume is contaminated due to extensive use of pesticides/insecticides/chemical fertilizers. The quality of soil is also degraded. These problems need to be addressed. An alternative solution to overcome above problems is the Soil-less Rooftop Organic Farming, wherein use of vermicompost and harmless biopesticides are promoted.

The practice: Staff & students of the college initiated the concept of Roof-top Organic Farming. 9' X 6' feet container is designed with underlying polymer sheets. Coco-peat and vermicompost is added in the peat in 60:40 ratios with addition of 1 kg azoato-bactor and 1 kg neem powder. New type of CSIS irrigation system containing central pipe and four crossed pipe at sub-surface region is used. Green nets are provided over the kits. During rainy season, it is further covered with plastic sheets. The ideas are derived from green house. The attributes of green house are inculcated in this practice. All small rooted crops can be cultivated such as chillis, brinjal, tomato, spinach, corriender, fenugreek, cucumber, bitter gourd, cabbage etc.

Evidence of Success: Students participated in 5th Indian Youth Science Congress Kolkata and 6th Indian Youth Science Congress, Guntur (A.P.), where the project on "Soil-less Roof Top Organic Farming" was selected as 3rd most relevant innovation to solve zero hunger challenge at national level.

The vegetables produced through this best practice are sold to the staff member and nearby locality and also used in girls' hostel mess.

Prof. M. S. Swaminathan, father of green revolution visited the college and appreciated the project.

Our students of B. Sc. Biotechnology have developed the further technology called Hydroponic-Organic roof top farming, which is cost effective as compared to conventional Soil-less Roof Top Organic Farming. This project was displayed at Raman Science Centre, Nagpur.

Problems encountered and resources required:

Polymer sheets, Coco-peat, vermicompost, azoato-bactor, neem powder, CSIS irrigation system, pipes, Green nets and plastic sheets.

Expertise on this project is available. The various News Channels and Print Media made this concept of "Soil-less Roof Top Organic Farming" popular.
